



Diver's dreams realized in Las Vegas production

Decorated diver Kaylea Arnett is creating her own brand of history as she flips a life of hard work and dedication into a career with elite worldwide entertainment company.

Arnett, a Chickasaw who began diving as a child in Oklahoma, is a performer in the acclaimed Cirque du Soleil "O" production at the Bellagio, where she dives off soaring towers, thrilling audiences multiple times a week.

Arnett has spent decades disregarding gravity artfully contorting herself midair from diving platforms.

She began diving in 2001, training about eight hours a day at the U.S. Diving Regional Training Center at Oklahoma City Community College. When the training center closed, the Arnett family moved to Spring, Texas, so she could continue her training.

The water-themed production of "O" features world-class acrobats, synchronized swimmers, divers characters who perform in and above a 1.5 million-gallon pool of water. The show's name, "O," is taken from the French word for water "eau."

"In Cirque du Soleil, I am a high diver, diving off 60-foot towers (mounted) from the ceiling into the water. It is a big job, and it is one of the most prestigious shows in the world. I feel very lucky to be here," Arnett said.

As she plunges from the platform into an aqua abyss, the athlete is simultaneously living her dreams reaping the rewards of years of sacrifice, hard work and dedication.

Through the years, Ms. Arnett garnered multiple awards, including a diving scholarship to Virginia Tech. She earned gold medals at the USA Diving National Championships as well as

numerous other events. She also qualified for the 2012 Olympic diving trials.

At 10 years old, she was the

youngest diver to qualify for

the U.S. team and competed

at the Junior Pan American

Games in Brazil, earning a bronze medal. Arnett was twice named Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) Women's Diver of the

Year and earned ACC Most

Valuable Diver Award three

times while at Virginia Tech.

She also earned a major in philosophy and a minor in Japanese.

As college graduation neared, thoughts of retiring from diving surfaced. "Everybody retires after school and goes on to real life, and I didn't want any part of that. I was not ready to let go of diving," Arnett said in a 2022 interview.

She was reminded plethora of options available with entertainment companies, such as cruise lines, amusement parks and productions such as Cirque du Soleil, which solidified her resolve to keep diving.

Arnett compiled a video reel and was hired by a Cirque du Soleil show in Macao, China, where she performed for about five years.

"I was doing Russian swing (a device used to make high acrobatic jumps) and high dives. I was dancing on

chandeliers, doing all kinds of bizarre things."

Then the pandemic shuttered entertainment venues and productions across the world, including the Macao show.

Later, she was offered an audition with the Las Vegas production. "Cirque du Soleil allows for more artistry. Diving is very technical and score-based. Being able to turn it into an art, it's a great experience," she said. "I'm trying new dives that aren't even on the book, and the audience is loving it."

Although a seasoned pro, she admits to occasionally feeling anxious while waiting for her cue on the towering platform, but once she takes the first step, her training takes over.

"There is always fear. It's just a matter of harnessing it."

Overcoming fears forging ahead are two traits Arnett learned from decades of training, and her late Chickasaw mother, Terrie, who died about three years ago following a courageous battle with cancer.

Cirque du Soleil "O" is presented twice a day, five days a week.

I am currently a graduate student at Arizona State University's Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law where I am working towards my Master of Legal Studies in Tribal Self Governance. Go Devils!

Growing up in Ak-Chin during the time I did was exciting, but bittersweet as well. I grew up first living with many of my aunts and cousins at my grandmother Evelina's home before my mother received her home in the firehouse subdivision.

We still had dirt roads, which made it hard to catch the bus on rainy days. I grew up watching my mother work hard not only as a single mom, but as she worked her way up to director at the Him-Dak Museum.

She taught me to always progress forward, have a strong work ethic and taught me about my O'odham heritage. We were also lucky enough to have many people help raise us, my grandmother Evelina, my aunts and uncles, especially my Uncle Norbert Peters

badt, and my godparents Bernadine and Benny Romo with my god sisters.

My upbringing done by so many people that taught me to have integrity, to care for others and to always have laughter in your

I was able to witness the solitude of the reservation during a time where Maricopa was a small city with two gas stations, no fast food and no traffic lights.

I attended school at Maricopa Elementary, Middle School and High School with the same group of kids and spent my summers attending summer school at the Ak-Chin Community Center and Him-Dak Museum.

Being able to listen to stories from Thelma Miguel badt as she taught us how to weave baskets, or listen to Theodore Enos badt laugh as he taught us how to plant squash at the museum are just a few of the lucky opportunities I had to connect me to my culture, that I don't see enough of today with the Ak-Chin youth.

I remember looking out the window and seeing nothing but farm fields on the way to school and seeing the fields of pecan trees as we drove to Casa Grande to get groceries, since there were no major grocery stores in Maricopa.

I witnessed not only the change that came about in Ak-Chin when Casino Harrah's was built, but once I graduated high school, I witnessed the economic boom in Maricopa that grew into many more homes and businesses that have yet to stop coming.

Over my life time I've been blessed to not only see the growth of Ak-Chin as we continue to prosper as people, as a community and with our enterprises, also to have the many benefits awarded to the membership as a result of so many of our tribal leaders' hard work.

There are so many things that I learned from my community that I would love to pass down to my children, that I myself am still continuing to learn and that would be: 1. The culture and language, 2. The importance of family, and 3. There are opportunities beyond the reservation.

I think it is important for my children to know who they are and where they come from. At a time where the cultural practices and languages of many tribes in the U.S. are dwindling, I want to continue to learn and teach them anything that

I can. I was lucky enough to take free classes Tohono O'odham Community College to learn the language, but I still have a long way to go to be a fluent speaker so I do my best to pass the little I learn to them

Through the accomplishments, failures and opportunities that I've encountered in life, it would not have been possible without my family, so I try to teach my children that they need to maintain strong familial bonds because family is who you will rely on and seek out during many of the highs and lows in life.

Being from a large family, we are lucky enough to be born with best friends and protectors right from the start.

Lastly, I want my children to not only be proud of where they are from, but to also understand there is so much more in the world than the reservation. I want them to travel and explore other ways of life. To set their goals high and to make our community proud by their representation of Ak-Chin in whatever path of life they choose

Advice that I have for the youth in our community is to believe in yourself. There are times in your life that you may feel alone even among an entire community, but

you should always build yourself up to have one relentless supporter -YOURSELF.

Find what you want to do in your life, what makes you happy, which at times may be multiple paths and pursue them. Find the people who support you, friends and family that are there to lift you up and motivate you to continue and keep

them close.

The failures are inevitable but necessary to help you succeed so appreciate them and value what you learn as a result of failing.

Be proud of who you are, be proud of your tribe, we are part of the 2% who are thriving and surviving in the U.S., we are "something else" for
