On July 6th, Vice President of the United States, Kamala Harris came to Arizona to visit with tribal nations as part of the Investing in America tour. This was an historic visit, as it was the first time a sitting U.S. President or Vice President has visited the Gila River Indian Community.

About 800 tribal leaders and officials were in attendance at Gila Crossing Community School to hear Harris speak, as she thanked everyone for the warm welcome, she and husband, Second Gentleman Douglas Emhoff received.

"It means so much to us, and it means so much to the

President, that we are able to be here with you to thank you for the partnership and the work that we have done and will continue to do together."

Gila River Indian Community Governor Stephen Roe Lewis shared in their press release, "This Administration has taken partnership to a whole new level. They have brought Tribes genuinely to the table, working with us on important investments and solutions for each Tribe's unique needs."

Prior to addressing tribal leaders, Harris met with young tribal leaders, while the Second Gentleman met with Community Veterans. "I was able to meet with some of the younger leaders before I came out here and when I look at them, I know the future of our world is so bright."

Ak-Chin Youth Council officers Doria Garcia, Haedin De Paola, and Kateri Lopez were among the youth in attendance invited to meet with the Vice President for a Youth Round-table discussion, alongside other youth from the Four O'odham Sister Tribes. Ak-Chin Youth Council Secretary, Kateri Lopez also had the opportunity to gift one of her beautiful paintings to Vice President Harris.

Congressman **Crane visits Ak-Chin**

Ak-Chin Indian Community July Thursday, Representative Eli Crane visits with Ak-Chin Council and tours the community.

Representative Eli Crane is currently serving his first term in Congress, while having the privilege serving as the U.S. Representative for Arizona's Second Congressional District.

This visit was sparked from a previous event in Washington D.C., where Ak-Chin Chairman Robert Miguel had first met Representative Crane. During this visit they discussed issues including flood control and drainage involving the washes surrounding the community.

The tour started at the two major washes near the farms, Smith and Vekol. Ak-Chin Farm Manager, Damian Murrieta led this part of the tour. Crane visited the pecan orchards, cotton fields and corn fields.

Murrieta later explained the importance of why Ak-Chin has made it a goal to address

In June, I attended a dinner hosted by Arizona Office of Tourism Director Lisa Urias, Governor Katie Hobbs and the Arizona Lodging and Tourism Association which featured guest speaker, Miguel Turruco Marques, Secretary of Tourism of Mexico.

Many other businesses, community and tribal leaders attended the event, which was held at the Arizona Biltmore in Phoenix.

The occasion was held to help discussions commemorate with regional Arizona and Mexico tourism leaders, culminating in signing a letter committing to increased tourism collaboration between Arizona and Mexico.

Following the dinner event. Chairman Miguel was able to engage in a conversation with Secretary Marques. "It's always great to meet with leaders from our neighboring country of Mexico to discuss potential opportunities that'll benefit both countries in tourism, commercial and industrial exchange and just overall to familiarize the direct relationship with one another." Chairman Miguel stated.

Ak-Chin highlighted at Self-Governance Conference

During the Tribal Self-Governance Conference in Tulsa, Oklahoma which took place in July, Ak-Chin's Self Governance Director Karen Fierro and myself, took part in helping organize the event as we were part of the committee.

organize the event, we were panelists in the categories of; "Tribal Self-Regulation Gaming Operations" which featured Ron Allen of the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe of Washington and myself.

Director of the Office of Self-Regulation, National Indian Gaming Commission and Kathy Clenney, Executive Director, Barona Gaming Commission were panelists during

the session. The two answered questions and commented on Tribal self-regulation and how tribes can potentially benefit in the process of regulating themselves.

The flexibility found in National Indian Gaming Commission regulations also exists in the Indian Regulatory Act, which provides for multi-jurisdictional regulatory framework that recognizes inherent sovereignty of Tribes.

Fierro was on a panel entitled "Negotiating Self-Governance Hovland, Agreements." Panelists Vice Chairwoman and included Matt Kallapa, Northwest Field Officer Department Manager, the Interior and Lindsey King, Director, Office of Tribal Self-Determination.

The group touched on



the process of Self-Governance Agreements, understanding how to plan, prepare for, negotiate Self-Governance agreements.

Karen did a wonderful presentation as did the others on the panel. We are truly blessed to have Karen representing the community in her capacity. She is truly known and highly regarded in both Indian Country and the United States for her outstanding work.

A special moment during the conference featured a short film entitled For Our People: Stories of Tribal Self-Governance Sovereignty Chin Indian Community Securing Access To Water."







On July 16th-17th the Johnson O'Malley Parent Committee distributed backpacks and other school supplies to kids in the community.









This year's summer youth program at Harrah's Ak-Chin Casino was packed with opportunities for our Ak-Chin students.

Harrah's Ak-Chin Summer Youth Program is an extended branch of the Harrah's Development System (HDS), which is geared to offer job skills

training and leadership development opportunities to Ak-Chin tribal members. HDS Manager, Erica Oliver oversees both the HDS Program and the Summer Youth Program.

The seven-week summer youth program exposes the Ak-Chin summer youth participants to educational,

informational, and cultural learning experiences. The summer youth participants worked in the non-gaming areas of the casino, which Housekeeping, include Facilities, Warehouse, and the Restaurants.

They attended new hire orientation and received an onboarding experience from HDS Manager, Erica Oliver, and the trainers, department orienting them to their roles, going over the performance expectations of the program.

During their time within summer program, the participants attended Resume Writing/ Interviewing **Techniques** Workshop, which provided an opportunity for the

participants to create their own resumes and participate in mock interviews. They were also taken on a tour at the Ak-Chin Airport, and attended a Man in the Maze cultural workshop, hearing about the teachings offered by Camillus Lopez.

Effective Communication

and Leadership Development are foundational components of the HDS Program. The summer youth participants Toastmasters attended meetings on-property at the casino which helped strengthen their impromptu and public speaking skills.
