The University of Arizona (UofA) and Northern Arizona University (NAU) opened their college football season with a game dedicated to the land acknowledgement agreement on September 2.

The University of Arizona designated this home game as the "Land Acknowledgment Game". On the University's about page, you can read "We respectfully acknowledge the University of Arizona is on the land and territories of UofA continues to page 5

Indigenous peoples. Today, Arizona is home to 22 federally recognized tribes, with Tucson being home to the O'odham and the Yaqui. Committed to diversity and inclusion, the University strives to build sustainable relationships with sovereign Native Nations and Indigenous communities through education offerings, partnerships, and community service."

In late July, Ak-Chin Youth Council received an invitation

from Christina Andrews, the Executive Director for the University of Arizona, Wassaja Carlos Montezuma Center for Native American Health. She was helping to organize this "Land Acknowledgement" for the UofA Football game in September.

The organizers requested that O'odham Youth Councils, Royalty, and Tribal Leaders be present to be acknowledged during the halftime show.

Department Profile: Enrollment

The Ak-Chin Enrollment office is located at 16472 N. Maricopa Rd. Maricopa, AZ 85139 (Corner of SR 347 & Farrell Rd). The department is run by Dorissa Garcia, Enrollment Coordinator and Vanessa Soliz, Enrollment Technician.

Garcia has worked in the community for about 25 years and in the enrollment department for 10 years.

Soliz has worked with the community for a total of 21 years and has been with enrollment for the last 5 years.

They are responsible for processing applications, helping community members with Tribal resources like birth certificates, state ID, probates and DNA testing.

They both agree one of the most rewarding highlights of working in the enrollment office is conducting the ancestry history process with the members.

"It brings me joy to see the look on member faces when the find out who they are related to," Garcia said.

City of Maricopa disregards Federal Order and disrespects Ak-Chin Indian **Community as city road crew Trespasses on Tribal Land**

Thursday morning, the City of Maricopa violated Tribal sovereignty and a federal order as a road crew working at the City's apparent direction began construction on a portion of Desert Sonoran Parkway that sits on Reservation land, adjacent to Ak-Chin Circle Entertainment Center. The work crew dispersed and left the scene at the instruction of Ak-Chin officials.

At issue is the City of Maricopa's lack of legal rightof-way necessary to conduct work along a strip of Desert Sonoran Parkway adjacent to the Entertainment Center.

The City's action Thursday is

in blatant disregard of multiple "cease-and-desist" orders issued by the federal Bureau of Indian Affairs, which has authority over Tribal land.

As recently as Sept.1, 2023, the BIA issued a letter to the City of Maricopa, Arizona Department of Transportation and the Ak-Chin Indian Community that stated: "The BIA requires ADOT and the City of Maricopa cease and desist any proposed roadway construction, traffic rerouting, traffic signal work or related activities ongoing or scheduled" until the city complies with federal requirements for the assignment of right-of-way.

"For decades the Ak-Chin followed."

Indian Community has been a good neighbor to the City of Maricopa, so it is deeply disappointing City officials have chosen a path of confrontation instead of cooperation when it comes to roadwork on Desert Sonoran Parkway" said Ak-Chin Chairman Robert Miguel.

"The Bureau of Indian Affairs could not have been clearer: the City must obtain proper rightof-way assignment and federal approval before proceeding with this project on Reservation land. On behalf of the Ak-Chin people, we will pursue all remedies at our disposal to defend our sovereignty and ensure the law is properly The Community celebrated 30 years of dedicated service with Marilyn Thompson, on September 8, 2023.





I have been in the field of education for 30 years with 20 of those years within the Gila River Indian Community as teacher, curriculum specialist, K-12/ JOM Manager, Academic Coach, Assistant Principal, Principal and Assistant Director of Tribal Education.

I began my teaching career on the Navajo Nation as an elementary teacher. I have taught elementary, gifted, middle and high school math and college.

During my time as K-12/JOM Manager our program received the 2013 National Johnson O'Malley Exemplary Program Award. I wrote and taught courses for K-12 gifted students at the ASU Center for Academic Precocity and wrote and taught online courses for gifted teacher certification for the University of Texas.

I am nearing completion of my doctoral degree in education leadership; my dissertation topic is 'Indigenous Decolonizing School Leadership.' My education philosophy has long been 'Student Centered/Data Driven.' My leadership style is Servant Leadership, seeking to serve students and staff.

I aspire to achieve Transformational Leadership, achieving more than what was thought possible.

As director I will strive to achieve the Community's education goals as a humble servant of the Ak-Chin Indian Community. I look forward to the possibilities, excited about what we can (and will) achieve.

September is Suicide Prevention Awareness Month and Ak-Chin Health and Human Services Department would like to share in the effort to spread helpful information to the community about such an important issue. It's a sad truth that people in pain often don't see a way out.

While the overall rates of suicide increased 2.6% from 2021 to 2022, it is encouraging to share that there was a decrease among American Indians and Alaska Native people (down 6.1%) and suicide rates in younger people, (ages 10-24) is down 8.4%, according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention.

There is hope for improvement when efforts are made to reach out and make people aware of the problem and offer support. What is important to know is that oftentimes teens who attempt suicide have given clear warning signs.

Here are some of the signs to look for:

- Talking about not wanting to live
- Talking about looking for ways to die, like trying to get pills or a gun

The Gila River Indian Community and Becker Boards join as title sponsors for this year's celebration.

In April of this year, Mayor Kate Gallego and the Phoenix City Council voted to designate the second Monday of October each year as a city holiday in observance of Indigenous Peoples' Day.

Organizers hope this year's festival theme "Indigenize the Valley" will catch on to other metropolitan areas and increase the awareness of Indigenous contributions and ingenuity prior to Arizona's statehood, since time immemorial.

- Talking about feeling hopeless or having no purpose
- Talking about feeling trapped or being in horrible pain
- Talking about being a burden to others
- Abusing drugs or alcohol
- Acting very nervous or on edge
- Doing dangerous things
- Sleeping a lot more than before or very little
- Not wanting to be around other people
- Changing quickly from one strong mood to another
- Doing some type of self-injury, like cutting
- Acting full of rage or talking about getting revenge
- Giving away favorite things

Often siblings or friends are more likely to recognize when another young person or family member is hurting, long before a parent or guardian does. Teens ask themselves "How can I help a friend who has suicidal thoughts?"

- If you think a friend is in immediate danger from suicide call 911 and do not leave him or her alone
- If a friend seems suicidal, ask the person to talk to you about what's going on. Listening shows you care. Remember, though, that you cannot help the person on your own.
- Encourage your friend to contact a suicide hotline.
- Suggest that your friend talk to an adult, and possibly offer to go with him or her.

If you are the one who is hurting and frustrated with life, if you are thinking about suicide? You may be feeling awful, you may think that suicide is the only answer — but it's not! Don't let suicide be the ending of your story.

There are people who want to help, and you can feel better. If you are thinking about suicide, please reach out for help right away.

- Ak-Chin Health and Human Service Department has behavioral health therapists on staff who can assist individuals who are struggling with suicidal thoughts. They can be reached at 520-568-1090
- You can contact the Lifeline helpline by chat, or call **<u>800-273-TALK</u>** <u>(8255)</u>
- You can also <u>Text 741-741</u> "Are You There?" For help, to talk to someone any time of the day, if you are in need. The people there can talk with you about your problems and help you plan to stay safe.
- If you are in immediate danger of hurting yourself, call <u>911</u>. You also can go to the nearest hospital emergency department.

Festival go-ers will be treated to Indigenous film screenings presented by Cahokia Phx and Indie Film Fest on Saturday, October 7, with the award-winning documentary "Imagining the Indian: The Fight Against Native American Mascoting" selected as the feature film among other shorts and documentaries.

This year's celebration also includes an inaugural bike ride, musical performances on the RezFest stage and unique arts, crafts, and experiences from Indigenous creatives.

Teams showed up to the Kaij Mek O:las Ki field a little before 5pm to prepare for playing, meanwhile vendors had began setting up and preparing their goods for the long evening ahead.

S-kubjuv Ju:dam was the third team to play, playing best 3 out of 5. Although Ak-Chin's ladies played their hardest, with a few playing for the first time, they fell short of moving up the bracket. A Homeowner's Guide to Healthy Habits for Clean Water

Stormwater

As stormwater flows over driveways, lawns, and sidewalks, it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants. Stormwater can flow into a storm sewer system or directly into a lake, stream, river, wetland, or retention basin. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated. Polluted runoff is the nation's greatest threat to clean water.

Healthy Household Habits for Clean Water

Vehicle and Garaging

- Use a commercial car wash or wash your car on a lawn or other unpaved surface to minimize the amount of dirty, soapy water flowing into the storm drain and eventually into your local water body. Use a hose nozzle and bucket to avoid water running into the street.
- Check your car, boat, motorcycle, and other machinery and equipment for leaks. Make repairs as soon as possible. Clean up spilled fluids with an absorbent material like kitty litter or sand and don't rinse the spills into a nearby storm drain. Remember to properly dispose of the absorbent material.
- Recycle used oil and other automotive fluids at participating service stations or hazardous waste collection centers. Don't dump these chemicals down the storm drain or dispose of them in your trash.

Lawn & Garden

• Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary,

use the chemicals in the recommended amounts. Avoid application if the forecast calls for rain; otherwise, chemicals will be washed into your local storm drain.

- Select native plants and grasses that are drought and pest resistant. Native plants require less water, fertilizer, and pesticides
- Sweep up yard debris rather than hosing down areas.
- Compost or Recycle yard waste when possible.
- Don't over water your lawn. Water between 3:00am and 9:00am April

 September and don't let water run off into a storm drain. Make sure sprinklers are aligned and not hitting driveways or sidewalks. Cycle your irrigation with breaks between to let water soak in. If water is running into the street, cut back irrigation time.
- Cover piles of dirt and mulch being used in landscaping projects to prevent these pollutants from blowing or washing off your yard and into local storm drains. Use

plants, rock or other mulch to prevent soil erosion.

Home Repair and Improvement

- Sweep up and properly dispose of construction debris such as mortar and concrete.
- Use hazardous substances like paints, solvents, and cleaners in the smallest amounts possible, and follow the directions on the label. Clean up spills immediately, and dispose of the waste at a hazardous waste collection facility. Store substances properly to avoid leaks and spills.
- Purchase and use non-toxic, biodegradable, recycled and recyclable products whenever possible.
- Clean paint brushes in a sink, not outdoors. Filter and re-use paint thinner when using oilbased paints. Properly dispose of excess paints through a household hazardous waste collection program or donate unused paints to local organization.

Pet Care

• Clean up after your pet! When walking your pet use a bag to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria to wash into storm drains and eventually into local retention basins and water bodies.

In the Yard

- When landscaping has all rock, dirt, sand, and mulch delivered and dumped on private property, not in the street or gutter line. Covering stockpiled landscaping materials before a storm will also prevent sediment from running into the streets and storm drains.
- After mowing the lawn, trimming bushes, or pulling weeds, sweep all sediment and debris from the street gutter line. Do not wash the debris into a storm drain or into the street.
- To reduce soil erosion and stormwater run-off use semipermeable surfaces rather than paved areas. Also increase the amount of vegetated area in your yard. Use native plants in your landscaping to reduce the need for watering during dry periods. Consider directing downspouts away from paved surfaces onto trees to increase infiltration and reduce polluted runoff.




