After a blessing and dinner, GED Instructor Desiree Guarino welcomed all to the event and Education Division Director Dr. Mario Molina gave the opening remarks.

According to Desiree, this was the

first year that the GED Graduation was ever held as its own independent event, separate from the Higher Education Recognition Banquet. In the past, these two events had always been combined. As a result, all of the speakers were specifically oriented to GED stories and experiences. “I was thrilled that we had four student speakers, representing four different GED graduating classes,” Guarino said.

Three student speakers shared their own stories of achievement post-GED, which included Class of 2013 Connie Alvarez, Class of 2016 Robin Vincent and Class of 2017 Bridget Carlyle. Walking in the evening’s ceremony was new

In addition, Ak-Chin member and Harrah’s HDS Manager, Erica Manuel, shared her GED story, demonstrating that GED graduates can strive for leadership within the community and earn college degrees as well.

Pumas secure another Championship win

Undefeated during the regular season, the Sequoia Pathway Puma girls squad continued the momentum on the big stage at Talking Stick Resort Arena to defeat East Valley Athletes for

Christ 46-43 in a close game that kept fans at the edge of their seats.

Previously during the regular season, Sequoia Pathway was able to size up EVAC, as the

Pumas came back after a sluggish start with a strong second half to win that matchup, 43-39.

With EVAC ranked ahead of the Pumas and dominating the

CAA Division III State Tournament against Maya and Heritage Academy Gateway prior to the Championship game, Pumas knew they had to come out hungry to secure a win.

“We knew we were going to come out here and have to fight, nobody was going to hand us anything today,” said Pathway coach Dee Estrada.

EVAC made sure that would ring true as they dominated the first quarter, starting the game with an unanswered 11-0 run, with Pumas cutting the lead in half 14-7 by the second quarter.

“They were really nervous and it showed in the first quarter,” Estrada said. “I literally stepped right in front of them on the floor and said, ‘Don’t forget this is the last time we’re stepping here together as a group. We did not work this hard the entire season to get this far to shut down now.’” The message was loud

and clear. Led by new Puma Che’leez Smith-Ralph and go-to leader Aleina Estrada, Pathway took charge by leading EVAC 23-22 at the half.

Pumas kept it close in the third quarter, trading the lead with EVAC as Coach Dee rested players for a short recharge. Ak-Chin Community member Noahli Antone saw playing time and gave a solid performance holding off EVAC on both sides of the court.

The leads continued to change in the fourth quarter, with the Pumas up 36-35 and six minutes to go. EVAC persisted and it was time for a new strategy, according to Coach Estrada.

“The strategy’s name is Aleina Estrada,” she said. “Get the ball in Aleina’s hands and she will guarantee to get those fouls and get us to the line and Aleina is an excellent free throw

Kaij Mek Ne'edam kc Keihindam welcomed at Community Gathering

The Community Gathering on February 27 at Ak-Chin Service Center was presented by Ak-Chin Language department and featured songs and dances by Kaij Mek Ne'edam kc Keihindam, who are from Kaj Mek in the Gu Achi District of Tohono O'odham Nation.

Ak-Chin's Vice Chairman Gabriel Lopez and Councilmember Delia Carlyle were present this evening. Lopez started the gathering with a blessing before dinner.

Enchiladas, tostadas, rice, beans and cookies were served. Youth in attendance lined up to serve their Elders first. While finishing dinner, Kaij Mek Ne'edam kc Keihindam arrived, who were invited by the Language program. Tony Lopez spoke on behalf of the group and said that they were not performing, but displaying their prayers and their Him-Dak.

The younger members of the group are the fifth and sixth generations of those who have passed on and have passed the traditions on, while the Elders of the group who are now the singers today were the dancers. With the dances and songs, there were many interpretations for the different formations. The symbols, or "lagta" the dancers carry represent the clouds, "cewag," the black

birds or swallows, "gigtwal," white birds, "tota u'uhig," geese or grey birds, "kokod," and rainbows, "kiohod."

The first part was E'eda Wopoda, which translates to "running in between," and the dances weaved in and out of patterns like clouds, rainbows, butterflies, whirl winds and wagon wheels.

According to Kaij Mek Ne'edam kc Keihindam, the songs start with telling the story of where the group comes from in T.O. and ends with the journey going back home to where they started. The Sikol Keihina, or traditional "round dancing," brought the Community together holding hands in a circle at the end of the dance.

Vice Chairman Lopez joined in and later remarked, "The Keihina (dances) are also a blessing to us, it's been a long time since I danced. When I was younger, our Elders used to tell us to jump high when the beat changes and kick the dirt up. My late uncle Alonzo Lopez told me, 'you're knocking on Mother Earth's door, let her know you are here and thank her for the blessing she has given and for her healing strength.'"

He continued, "The songs, the rattle and basket drum bring healing powers, no matter what kind of day you maybe

be having. Once you hear an O'odham song, it makes all that is compressing on your life go away and takes out all the negative energy and restores it with positive energy."

Both Councilmembers present stood up and gave thanks to Kaij Mek Ne'edam kc Keihindam for blessing the Community. Vice Chairman Lopez got to know Louie "Tony" Lopez and the Lopez family in the past five years of participating in the pilgrimage to Magdalena, Sonora Mexico. On their journey, Louie would tell Vice Chairman of the places that they would camp and the songs that talk about that area. This pilgrimage is also a cleansing and healing journey to him.

"In my opinion, with everything that is happening in this day, we need more songs and dances of healing," said Vice Chairman Lopez. "It is really sad what is happening to our sacred, traditional and cultural sites, all over this country. These places are where our songs and dances come from, its who we are as Indigenous people, Indigenous to the land, ITS OUR HIM-DAK!!(Way of Life)."

At the end of the gathering, Ak-Chin Language Technician Lusan Enos joined Tony Lopez and another Kaij Mek Ne'edam kc Keihindam dancer in a fun dance, a touching moment that everyone enjoyed.

The Ak-Chin Elder women visit the Elders in the Craft room. make Easter bunnies every year around this time and sell them in Ak-Chin.

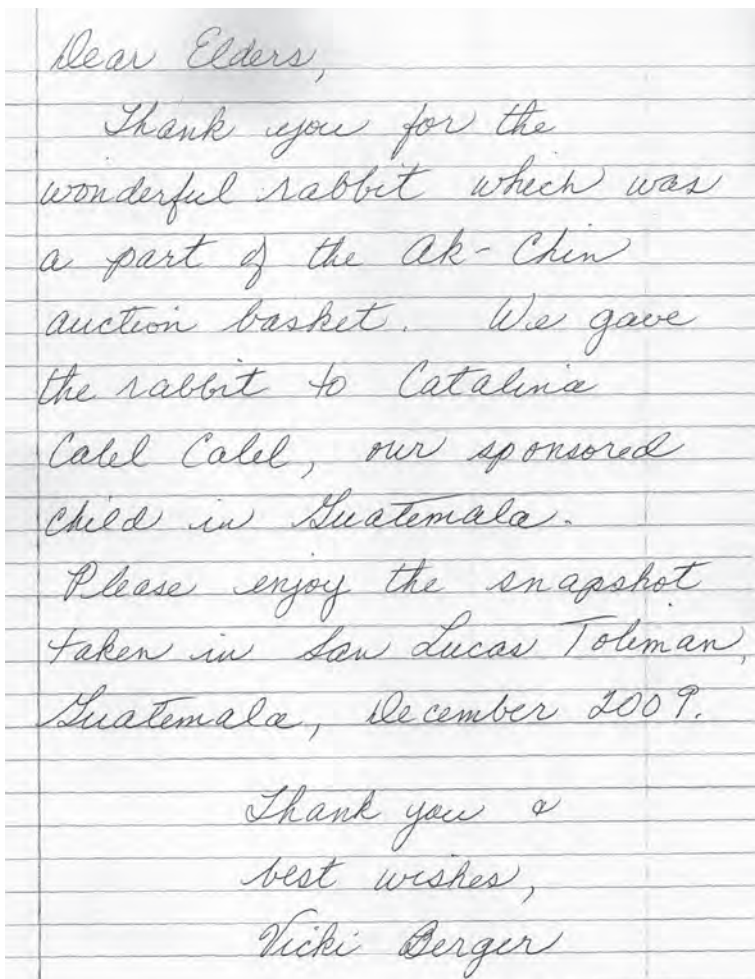
Recently, they learned that one of their rabbits hopped all the way to Guatemala!

WHAT IS THE PPE?

Presidential Preference Election (PPE) is Arizona's opportunity to vote and let their parties know who they prefer as their presidential candidate in the upcoming General Election.

WHAT PARTY IS PARTICIPATING IN THE PPE?

The Democratic Party is the only party participating in this election.

WHAT CANDIDATES ARE ON THE BALLOT?

What you need to know about coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19)

What is coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19)?

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) is a respiratory illness that can spread from person to person. The virus that causes COVID-19 is a novel coronavirus that was first identified during an investigation into an outbreak in Wuhan, China.

Can people in the U.S. get COVID-19?

COVID-19 is spreading from person to person in China, and limited spread among close contacts has been detected in some countries outside China, including the United States. At this time, however, this virus is NOT currently spreading in communities in the United States. Right now, the greatest risk of infection is for people in China or people who have traveled to China. Risk of infection is dependent on exposure. Close contacts of people who are infected are at greater risk of exposure, for example health care workers and close contacts of people who are infected with the virus that causes COVID-19. CDC continues to closely monitor the situation.

Have there been cases of COVID-19 in the U.S.?

Yes. The first case of COVID-19 in the United States was reported on January 21, 2020. The current count of cases of COVID-19 in the United States is available on CDC's webpage at <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/cases-in-us.html>.

How does COVID-19 spread?

The virus that causes COVID-19 probably emerged from an animal source, but now it seems to be spreading from person to person. It's important to note that person-to-person spread can happen on a continuum. Some diseases are highly contagious (like measles), while other diseases are less so. At this time, it's unclear how easily or sustainably the virus that causes COVID-19 is spreading between people. Learn what is known about the spread of newly emerged coronaviruses at <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/about/transmission.html>.

What are the symptoms of COVID-19?

Patients with COVID-19 have had mild to severe

respiratory illness with symptoms of

- fever
- cough
- shortness of breath

What are severe complications from this virus?

Many patients have pneumonia in both lungs.

How can I help protect myself?

The best way to prevent infection is to avoid being exposed to the virus that causes COVID-19.

There are simple everyday preventive actions to help prevent the spread of respiratory viruses. These include

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available.

If you are sick, to keep from spreading respiratory illness to others, you should

- Stay home when you are sick.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

What should I do if I recently traveled to China and got sick?

If you were in China within the past 14 days and feel sick with fever, cough, or difficulty breathing, you should seek medical care. Call the office of your health care provider before you go, and tell them about your travel and your symptoms. They will give you instructions on how to get care without exposing other people to your illness. While sick, avoid contact with people, don't go out and delay any travel to reduce the possibility of spreading illness to others.

Is there a vaccine?

There is currently no vaccine to protect against COVID-19. The best way to prevent infection is to avoid being exposed to the virus that causes COVID-19.

Is there a treatment?

There is no specific antiviral treatment for COVID-19. People with COVID-19 can seek medical care to help relieve symptoms.

Garcia, Carlyle and Carlyle-Coester gave the closing remarks.

After letting it sink in that they had their GEDs, graduates moved their tassels, got up to the middle of the room and tossed their hats in the air as all in attendance celebrated the moment.

GED graduation ceremonies for the Community have been held since February of 2014, celebrating the 25 graduates of 2013, which was Ak-Chin's largest GED graduating class ever.

"I have worked with several of the students for a few years and a couple for only a few short months. All of the seven graduates were Ak-Chin members this year, which is not always the case," says Guarino.

"We also sometimes assist residents in the program, upon Council approval. In addition, two of this year's graduates participated in Ak-Chin's Education Leave Program, which allows employees of the community to attend class during work time, upon supervisor and HR approval."

Guarino delivers a parting message for all GED

graduates:

"I would like to thank the Ak-Chin GED Class of 2019. This is the first class in my seven years with the community, in which ALL of the years' GED graduates attended the ceremony. It might have taken a little persuasion on my part, but I really appreciate that they ALL came out to celebrate with their family and friends.

Congrats again to the GED Class of 2019 and now it's time to build the Class of 2020! Who will be standing at the podium with me at graduation next year? There are over 20 students in the community who have already passed one or more subjects of the GED exam within our program. Now is the time for many of them to return to class and finish what they started. Take it one step at a time and it will happen. Just don't give up!"

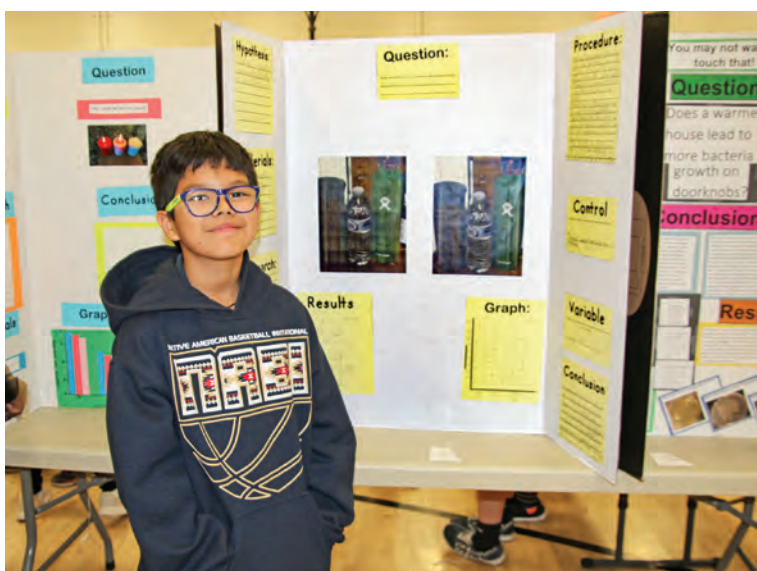

Zachary Valles Garcia soars at Leading Edge Academy

Which water bottle would keep liquid the coldest? That was the science experiment young Zachary Valles Garcia was to demonstrate during Leading Edge Academy's Science Fair on February 26.

Using a plastic water bottle, Contigo bottle and a Hydro Flask, Zach had his containers on hand for his experiment. His hypothesis was that between the three bottles, the Hydro flask would keep the water colder longer. Zach, a fifth grader at LEA, researched the test subjects, learning about the creator of the Polyethylene terephthalate (PET) bottle, the first plastic bottle that was able to withstand pressure of carbonated liquids. He would then learn about Travis Rosbach and Cindy Morse who were inventors of the Hydro

Flask. He also learned about how Contigo in Spanish means "with you" and other various facts about the products he was testing, such as costs for Hydro Flasks, which could be up to \$300 USD and the most expensive water bottle on the market, priced at \$2,499.00.

Starting the procedure Zack poured a cup and a half of ice-cold water into each container then recorded the temperature of the water in each bottle with a thermometer. He then set the bottles out for a 24-hour period, in order for the process to start. When the 24 hours were up he began to record the temperature of the water in each bottle to see what the results were and just like his hypothesis stated the Hydro flask kept the water the coldest

after 24 hours, thus concluding his experiment.

With a poster board, some glue and the data collected, Zachary began to put together his presentation for the fair. Held in the school's gymnasium, students and faculty set up their displays. Surrounded by peers Zachary welcomed all who wanted to know more about the experiment, giving them the rundown of the hard work, he'd been cultivating the last few weeks.

On Friday, February 28, Zachary received the Respect Award at Leading Edge Academy's award ceremony. The certificate is given in acknowledgment of the excellent character traits in the students.

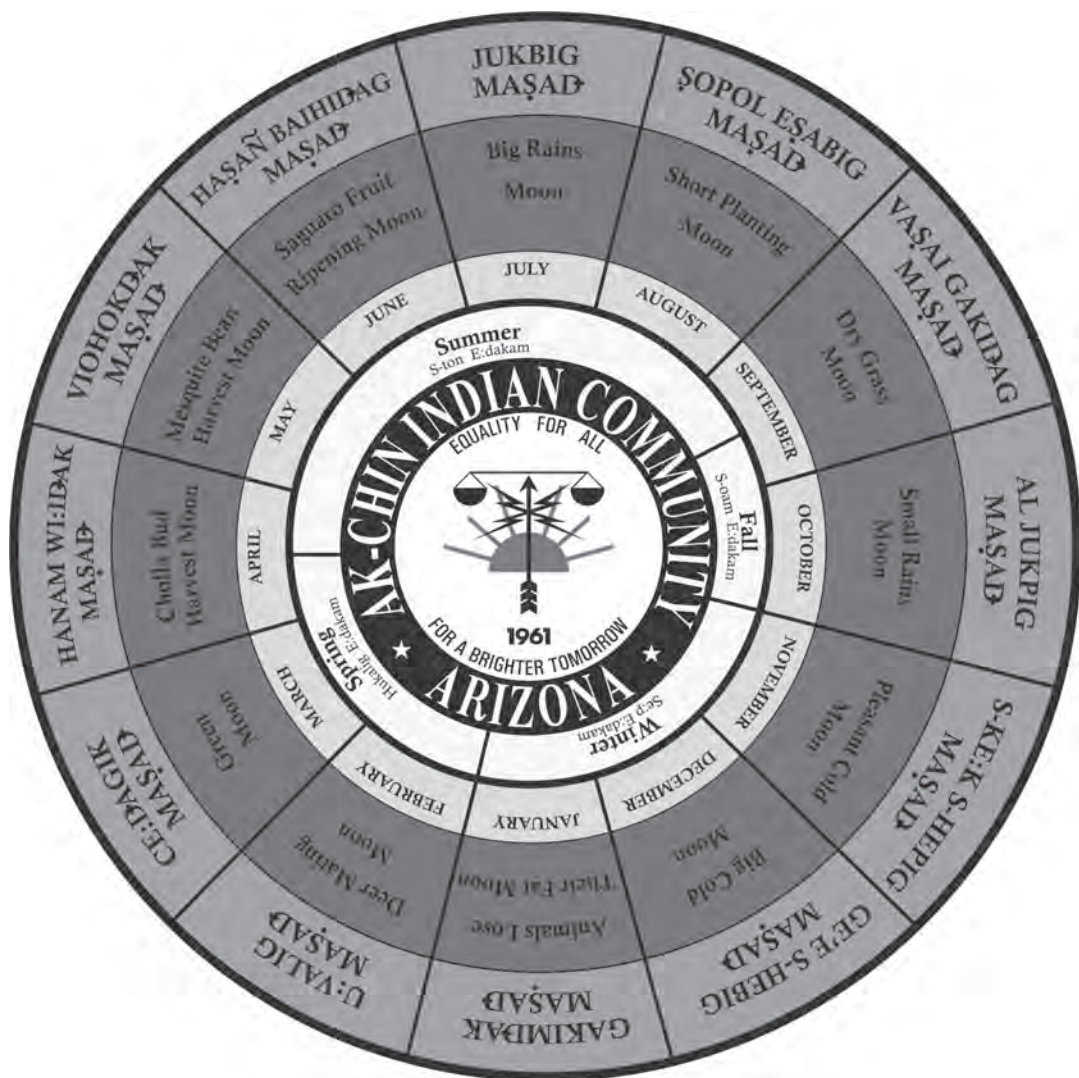

On March 3, the first O'odham Neok Ki Language Class Novice II was held at the Ak-Chin Language trailer and focused on members, residents and employees who have a basic knowledge and understanding of how to greet others in the O'odham language.

Eight learners attended, some having completed the

Novice I class held at the end of last year, and others joining for the first time.

Novice II picks up where the greetings left off, and the first night gave a chance for learners to apply the knowledge to greeting visitors to their home and inviting them in to sit, talk, and offer a beverage or food.

Some phrases learned

during the class are “l:vak,” which means “come in” and “daiwa,” which means “have a seat.”

Next up is learning what to say or do when your guest leaves your home.

Novice II classes are held every Tuesday in March, from 5:30-6:30pm at the Language trailer.

O'odham Ñeok Ki Language Class Novice II

Tuesday's March 3, 2019 Through March 31, 2020

Beginning March 3, 2020, the Language Department will be offering its second series of classes that focuses on the Novice I (Beginner) language learner. This class will build from the previous language class where students were taught and shown the proper way to greet others in the O'odham Ñeok.

The second series will instruct on greeting visitors to the home, then inviting them into the home to sit and talk. A part of the O'odham culture and heritage incorporates generosity and sharing; this class will use an understanding of O'odham Himdak and encourage the language learner to now sit and talk with their visitor(s) while offering a beverage, a portion of food and general dialogue that can be found in the O'odham home.

ON DEMAND RESPONSE SERVICE

Ak-Chin Tribal Transit focuses on Safety, Reliability and Efficiency.

IMPORTANT DETAILS ABOUT ON DEMAND SERVICES

- The date and time of travel
- Your pick-up time and address
- Your destination address and time of arrival
- Your return time and address if those services are necessary
- Verify whether you will be using a mobility aid such as a wheelchair, walker or service animal.
- Confirm total amount of passengers that will be riding

SAFETY

For your safety, please stand back and do not attempt to load until the vehicle has come to a complete stop. Standing on the vehicle while it is in motion is not permissible until the vehicle has come to a complete stop. Repeated offenses of safety will result in the passenger losing riding privileges. Guardians must be with their children during boarding and disembarking from the vehicle for the safety of all passengers in your group. If children try to board without the presence of their guardian, we will hold boarding until the guardian arrives.

BE READY FOR YOUR TRIP

When making a reservation, you will be given an approximate pick up time. Please keep in mind that this is an approximate and while we do our best to always be on time, safety is our priority. Please be ready and waiting for the vehicle. Once your trip is scheduled and you board the vehicle, you may not change your destination. If changing your destination is absolutely necessary, please understand we may not be able to accommodate your existing drop of time requested. Last minute changes will not be allowed to disrupt other passenger scheduled times.

PASSENGER ASSISTANCE

Drivers are not allowed to lose sight of their vehicle at any time. Transit staff are only allowed to leave their seat in order to assist a passenger. Please note that Transit staff will not go into your home or knock on doors.

NO SHOWS

If you are not present when the vehicle arrives, the driver will wait five minutes. After five minutes, the driver must proceed with the route and the passenger will be marked as a no-show. After three no-shows, our services will be declined to you for 30 days. On demand services at times can run on a heavy schedule. Please understand that once a passenger arrives at their destination the driver will not wait for a passenger to get back on the vehicle. They will proceed with the route unless special accommodations were already made with dispatch. We can always be scheduled to return and take you to another location at a future time.

SEATBELTS

All Transit vehicles are equipped with seatbelts. In compliance with state law, Ak-Chin Tribal Transit requires you to wear your seatbelt at all times during transport. This is for your safety and the safety of others. Any passenger refusing to wear their seatbelt will not be granted services.

WHEELCHAIR SECUREMENT

The Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) title 49 states that Transit "may require that wheelchair users make use of securement systems for their mobility devices." This section gives Ak-Chin Tribal Transit the right to choose whether or not wheelchairs must be tied down. We exercise this right and insist on securing the wheelchair. We require a four point securement. If the chair cannot be secured using this method, the tie down will be completed as effectively and safely as possible. Our staff is trained in proper tie-down techniques. Customers that do not want their wheelchair secured may not be transported.

CARRY-ON ITEMS

To ensure the safety of our passengers, large quantities of items will be placed in the securely in the rear of the vehicle. Carts or strollers must be folded prior to boarding, and may need to be secured once inside. Open food and non-alcoholic beverages are acceptable as long as you use the appropriate waste receptacles and be considerate of other passengers. Trash left on the vehicle is a violation. Abuse of our policies will result in the passenger losing riding privilege. Smoking is not allowed.

CANCELLING A RIDE

If a trip needs to be cancelled, you are urged to cancel it as early as possible. We ask for a 15 minute notice. If a 15 minute notice is not given, you will be considered a no show. Reliable and on time transportation can be difficult to achieve when proper protocols are not followed.

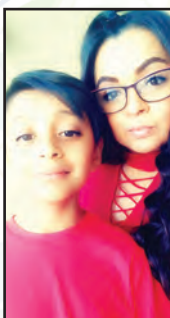

Demand-Response Service Schedule: Monday-Friday from 8:15am to 4:30pm.*

Demand-response services are available within the Ak-Chin Indian Community and most commercial and government addresses located within a five-mile radius of Community boundaries. Without exception, **ALL RESERVATIONS MUST INCLUDE EITHER A PICK-UP OR DROP-OFF LOCATION WITHIN THE AK-CHIN INDIAN COMMUNITY.** Our demand-response service is a reservation based system which operates on a first-come first-served basis. We recommend that you make your reservation at least 2 hours in advance of your requested pick-up time. You may make a reservation up to 7 days in advance. Last minute requests may be accommodated if the schedule permits but may not always be available. Reservations may be made Monday through Friday, from 8:00am to 5:00pm. **You must be 15 years or older to make reservations for our demand-response service.** *Ak-Chin Tribal Transit generally does not operate on holidays recognized by the Ak-Chin Indian Community

New Native American Film ‘Touch the Water’ Gets Green Light!

MESA — Despite still needing actors, locations and with only partial funding in place, Holt Hamilton Films declares they are moving full speed ahead on their next feature film production. “I’ve never had everything in perfect place before starting any journey in my life. Maybe it’s just me, but at some point, you’ve got to go for it- win or lose. Stop thinking about it, planning it, and just kneel down with a prayer, tighten up the boot straps, buckle your seat belt, step on the gas and hang on!” said writer/director Holt Hamilton with a smile, “I just don’t know how to get it done any other way, maybe someday, but I’m not there yet.”

The production company recently opened auditions to a world audience with an online audition and submission process that ended on 22 Feb 2020. Over 100 applicants submitted and are still under review. Hamilton stated that they have opened the online submission opportunity back up today and will let it run until the 14th of March. Final Casting decisions will be made the 21st

In addition to the online audition process open to all the world, Holt Hamilton Films will have their first in person audition for ‘Touch the Water’ this coming Saturday, March 7th. The audition will run from 1-3pm at the Native Health center in Phoenix, Arizona (4041 N. Central Ave, Bldg C, Phoenix, AZ 85012). “Native Health has supported us in many ways over the years and now again with space to hold auditions in downtown Phoenix. I was amazed when I did a recent walk through with Susan Levy at the facility. The space was large and perfect for what I wanted. We’re thankful for their partnership in our film journey over the years.” Hamilton stated.

‘Touch the Water’ is scheduled for production in April/May with a planned theatrical release this fall. The movie portrays an eighty-year-old woman and plans on shining light into the struggle a person

goes through as age increases. ‘You are never too old to dream’ is the film’s tagline.

Movie Logline: When a young intern at the local Senior Day Center challenges Daisy, an accomplished Native American elder, to dream again, she re-evaluates her tired frail body with her still youthful mind to set out on a stirring quest to fulfill a life-long dream.

Another unique thing Hamilton is doing for his audience on ‘Touch the Water’, is removing the curtain from his nontraditional filmmaking process by allowing viewers to ‘Follow the Journey’ on their YouTube channel ‘Holt Hamilton Films’ as he works to make the movie happen. They have released 24 episodes and plan to continue with the episodes through the theatrical release of the movie.

“There hasn’t been a lot of views yet, but I feel it’s right to share this information. If nothing else, it may inspire another filmmaker or two and help them realize that the struggle is similar whether you are in Hollywood with money or your own backyard shed turned office.”
