500 words, so by the time they are three years old their vocabulary will have grown tremendously and preschoolers will know at least 2,000 words.

•One way to help build vocabulary and hear language is to parallel talk, which is watching a child and you talk about the actions they are doing or things they are playing with or maybe evening thinking and feeling. But not expecting the child to talk back. Think about a sports broadcaster.

•Coincide talking is the same as parallel talk, but you are talking about what you are doing instead of the child. You will be descriptive in naming items and what you are doing.

•Reading books, playing board games (preschool age such as Candy Land-teaches counting, quantifying, and colors; Chutes and laddersboth games help with language development, taking turns, and following rules.), giving everything you see a label (ex. Basketball, soccer ball, baseball, football)

•The more detailed you are with your words the more successful your child will be. Which will lead to less stress for your child(ex. Not being understood) and much better communication as they build their vocabulary and they start to talk more. •London researchers found that washing your hands can decrease the risk of respiratory illness by 16%; and It can also decrease diarrhea diseases related deaths by 50%.

•If everyone regularly washed their hands, it is estimated that a million deaths can be prevented a year.

•80% of infections are spread by hand.

•Washing your hands at least five times a day can decrease the frequency of colds, flus (influenza), and other infections.

Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian To Open National Native American Veterans Memorial Nov. 11

The National Museum of the American Indian will open the new National Native American Veterans Memorial Wednesday, Nov. 11. The moment will be marked with a short virtual message to honor the service and sacrifice of Native veterans and their families. The message will be on both the museum's <u>website</u> and its <u>YouTube</u> <u>channel</u>. Online at <u>https://americanindian.</u> <u>si.edu/visit/washington/nnavm</u>

"The National Native American Veterans Memorial will serve as a reminder to the nation and the world of the service and sacrifice of Native American, Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian veterans," said Kevin Gover, director of the museum. "Native Americans have always answered the call to serve, and this memorial is a fitting tribute to their patriotism and deep commitment to this country."

The memorial, which sits on the grounds of the museum, was commissioned by Congress to give "all Americans the opportunity to learn of the proud and courageous tradition of service of Native Americans in the Armed Forces of the United States." Native Americans have served in every major military conflict in the U.S. since the Revolutionary War. This will be the first national landmark in Washington, D.C., to focus on the contributions of American Indians, Alaska Natives and Native Hawaiians who have served in the military. Memorial, the museum has published Why We Serve: Native Americans in the United States Armed Forces, a 240-page book that commemorates the history of Native American military service. Native Americans serve in the military at one of the highest rates of any ethnic group, and the book explores the many reasons why—from love of home to the expression of warrior traditions.

The book is co-authored by Alexandra Harris and Mark Hirsch, senior editor and historian, respectively, at the National Museum of the American Indian. Other contributors include; Sen. Ben Nighthorse Campbell (Northern Cheyenne), Rep. Deb Haaland (Pueblo of Laguna), Rep. Markwayne Mullin (Cherokee Nation), Gover (Pawnee), Jefferson Keel (Chickasaw) and Herman Viola.

The museum will host a virtual discussion with Harris about identity and the warrior stereotype of Native people serving in the military, as well as actual—and remarkable—traditions of peace and war within American Indian communities. The event takes place Thursday, Nov. 12, at noon EST. Details for registering for this Zoom event are available at AmericanIndian.si.edu.

Ak-Chin Environmental Protection Department - Working to Keep the Community's Water Safe

Do you know where your tap water comes from? The Ak-Chin Indian Community's primary drinking water source is Colorado River water, delivered to the Ak-Chin Reservoir via the Central Arizona Project (CAP) and the Santa Rosa Canal System. The Ak-Chin Reservoir serves Ak-Chin Farm's irrigation demand and feeds the Community's Surface Water Treatment Plant (SWTP), which purifies the source water for consumption by Community members. In recent years, the source water has experienced occasional degradation in quality, which can pose a variety of challenges.

To ensure safe drinking water for the Community and its members, the Ak-Chin Environmental Protection Department (EPD), with grant funding from a USEPA Direct Implementation Tribal Cooperative Agreement, selected Carollo Engineers, Inc. to embark on a source water assessment project. The purpose of the project was to identify the potential causes of the source water degradation, determine the impacts on the existing water treatment facility, and provide an update on EPD's efforts to continue to improve the Community's drinking water quality.

A review of historical water quality data concluded that levels of arsenic, chromium, iron, manganese, nitrate, perchlorate, sulfate, and total dissolved solids (TDS) in the source water have occasionally exceeded water quality standards. Figures 1 and 2, which represent data collected by EPD and Ak Chin Farms at the Ak-Chin Reservoir, illustrate examples where the

They were guided by former Education Division Director, Dr. Mario Molina, along with Dr. Duff Galda of TOCC, and addressed instructional learning modules among the following topics:

Community's raw water supply contained elevated levels of contaminants like nitrate and TDS compared to typical CAP water. A majority of these contaminants are NOT typically found in CAP water but are commonly found in Arizona groundwater.

To determine the origin of these water quality issues, two potential sources of contamination were investigated intrusion of storm water and/or irrigation return water and groundwater pumped into the canal by irrigation companies.

The Carollo team conducted a virtual and field inspection of the canal system to identify any potential sources of contamination. With the exception of occasional areas of floating debris/trash and several cracked panels, which are being addressed by the Maricopa-Stanfield Irrigation and Drainage District (MSIDD) during the fourth quarter of 2020, the Santa Rosa Canal is generally in acceptable condition. There were no obvious signs of intrusion of storm water or agricultural return water along the canal. The results of the inspections are shown in Figure 3.

However, based on the groundwater quality data collected by EPD, Ak-Chin Farms and the Community's consultants, the observed source water contamination can be potentially attributed to groundwater pumped into the canal by the Central Arizona Irrigation and Drainage District (CAIDD) and the MSIDD. As shown in Figures 4 and 5, several of the irrigation district wells contain elevated levels of

The memorial design is by Harvey Pratt (Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes of Oklahoma), a multimedia artist, retired forensic artist and Marine Corps Vietnam veteran. The design features an elevated stainless steel circle resting on a carved stone drum. It also incorporates water for sacred ceremonies, benches for gatherings and four lances where veterans, family members, tribal leaders and others can tie cloths for prayers and healing.

The museum planned to host a dedication ceremony and veterans' procession to mark the memorial's completion but postponed those events due to current health and safety guidelines. The museum will reschedule both events when it is safe to do so.

Major support for the National Native American Veterans Memorial has been provided by the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes; Chickasaw Nation; Margaret A. Cargill Philanthropies; Poarch Band of Creek Indians; San Manuel Band of Mission Indians; and Shakopee Mdewakanton Sioux Community. The memorial has also been widely supported by tribal governments and tribal veterans organizations. More than 85 tribes, individuals, corporations and other organizations have contributed to the memorial.

Why We Serve: Native Americans in the United States Armed Forces Book and Exhibition

To coincide with the completion of the National Native American Veterans

The exhibition "Why We Serve" tells poignant, personal stories of Native American veterans. It details the history of more than 250 years of Native American participation in the military, from colonial times to the present day. The exhibition will be on online and on view in the museum's Potomac Atrium beginning Nov. 11.

"Native Words, Native Warriors" Educational Module

This <u>module</u>, part of the museum's Native Knowledge 360° educational initiative, honors the legacy of Native Code Talkers who created secret military communications based on their languages. Their efforts significantly aided Allied victories during World Wars I and II.

The Veterans History Project



"We'll be packing items a little different due to what we're able to do, as a small group making a big impact." Kirk shared.

Mike's dad served in the Air Force for 26 years. They were overseas for eight years, stationed in England and Turkey. "Living overseas was very different. I went to three different high schools in three years."

When he lived in Turkey, during 7th – 9th grades Mike was on the wrestling team and they had to take a a C130 crop plane to their wrestling meets.

He enjoyed the camaraderie among other military children, "It didn't' matter who you were or with, you were all Americans." He felt a strong sense of belonging, like that of the community "especially overseas" that was very impactful.

Kirk joined the Air Force, November 24, 1987. He served four years active and four years reserve. After basic training in Lackland AFB, San Antonio TX, where he spent Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years, he trained as a vehicle operator/dispatcher.

He was then sent directly to RAF Alconbury in the United Kingdom, and "learned to drive buses and tractor trailers on the opposite side of the road."

He and Mike may have crossed paths without even knowing it during a stint in Turkey. Kirk served through the end of the Cold War and during Desert Shield/Desert Storm – KFIA, Saudi Arabia. He also served at England AFB, Alexandria, Louisiana and Barksdale, AFB, Bossier City, Louisiana.

Kirk said he joined the Air Force because, "I loved airplanes and wanted to work with them," and misses "the sound of jets taking off." Which make sense about old habits he picked up, "ability to sleep through loud noises."

permission. He attended basic training at Fort Jackson South Carolina during the Summer of 1991, and remembers it "HOT Very HOT! I grew up in the Midwest and did not understand what hot and humid was until then! I also lost 74 pounds that summer!"

His motivation to enlist was "due to the first Gulf War in the 1990-1991 and was discharged right before we went back over in 2000!" Once he got out he went to college and joined the ROTC program to become an officer.

He met his wife through the ROTC program, and she became an officer with orders to Hawaii. Bob became her dependent, and also served at Diamond Head Hawaii in the Reserves, and Reserve Unit in Illinois for 2 years.

He said, "being in Hawaii for 3 years were fun memories." He also shared that "running" was the biggest challenge for him in the military, and "making my bed everyday" was a habit he picked up from serving.

He still keeps in touch with former service buddies, "there is a group of us that have been together for over 25 years. We have shared weddings, births, divorces and stay in touch via Facebook and when our paths cross. None of us are in the same state! A few are still overseas!"

Asked if he would do it over again, Bob shared, "Yes! I would have also toughed it out and stayed in for my 20 and been retired now!" He has three children and hopes that at least one of them "seeks to serve their country in some aspect."

Bob's words of wisdom for anyone wanting to join the military, "Keep your mouth shut! Listen to the people leading you with the experience. Their wisdom is usually learned through life lessons and not a book!"

contaminants like TDS and nitrate. When pumped for an extended period, especially during winter months when the canal's surface water volume is low, the impact on water quality could be substantial. A blending model was developed to simulate the water quality under various water supply scenarios. The model confirmed that these irrigation wells could reasonably be the source of the observed water quality issues at the Ak-Chin Reservoir. designed to treat groundwater contaminants such as nitrate, TDS, chromium, perchlorate, sulfate, etc.

To assist in addressing the current water quality concerns, the Community is coordinating with the canal agencies to minimize/ eliminate the pumping of these wells into the Santa Rosa Canal. In addition, to further ensure Community, EPD has installed a reverse osmosis (RO) system to treat groundwater for blending with the treated surface water. RO provides a very high degree of treatment designed to remove a wide range of groundwater contaminants including nitrate, TDS, arsenic, etc. and produce a high-quality, purified water. By blending the RO product water with the treated surface water from the SWTP, the Community can produce safe drinking water

under a variety of source water conditions.

The Community's SWTP was designed to remove typical surface water contaminants such as turbidity, total suspended solids, total organic carbon, and pathogens. When properly operated, it can also be effective in reducing iron, manganese, and arsenic to acceptable drinking water levels. However, the current treatment plant was not

It is important to dispose of these unused hazardous materials in a responsible manner to protect Sanitation the workers and environment. Α few

examples of common hazardous household waste items that will be accepted during collection event the include antifreeze, used motor oil/filters, automotive fluids, fluorescent light bulbs, compact fluorescent lights (CFL), paint, paint thinners, solvents, batteries, pesticides, herbicides, propane gas cylinders, lawn and garden chemicals, household cleaners, batteries, and rimless tires. E-Waste materials accepted include cell phones, tv's, computers, monitors, printers, and other similar electronic equipment. Items NOT accepted include ammunition, loose needles, biological and radioactive waste, or home appliances.
