

The tournament featured 2024 Native American Basketball Invitational NABI girls' gold division champions, the Rez Bombers, led by Brigham Young University





## **Spot 99 Landing** Competition held at Ak-Chin Regional

If you're an airplane enthusiast and love to watch pilots master the craft of precise landings, the Ak-Chin Regional Airport was the place to be on Saturday, April 5th, as the Phoenix Chapter of the International Organization of Women Pilots, the Ninety-Nines, hosted a spot landing competition.

Spot landing is a competition where pilots attempt to land on a spot designed on the runway. The competition testes the proficiency for short field landings. Pilots get more points for landing as closely as

they possibly can to the spot designated on the runway.

There was a good group of spectators gathered to watch the skills of the pilots who participated in the contest. At the conclusion of the event, lunch was served and awards were handed out to winners.

"It is a great way for the pilots to fellowship and meet one another," said organizer Jessica "Trophies Reynolds. were given out for first, second and third place. Then there was a trophy given out for the pilot who needed the most

improvement, which was the one who placed last."

Trophies that were given out were colored airplane engine pistons.

One of the purposes of the event, which has taken place at Ak-Chin's Regional Airport for nine of the ten years of its existence, is to provide education, scholarships, and mentoring for female pilots. These events help raise monies to support these causes. The one year the event took place in another airport facility, was when the event's inception took place at Wickenburg Airport.




